PROTECTING OUR CANALS AND LAKES

Attention Homeowners, especially those along the lakes and canals:

It is very important to limit the amount of fertilizer and pesticides used on the land area adjacent to the waterways. Remember, any chemical product used on the land, ends up in the water due to run off. Also when cutting, removing or trimming vegetation (including just grass) along the water, make sure to remove it so it does not end up being blown into the canals or lakes and adding to our algae problem. We are in the process of treating the algae growth now and this will keep it from becoming a bigger problem. Thanks for your cooperation.”

Efforts that homeowners along the canal and lakes can do on their own is to rake out weeds, these can either be dried out and burned or taken to the transfer station on Sandridge for disposal.

Chill – It Was Only a Drill: AHAB Siren Results

South Bend, Washington – As part of a true “end-to-end” test of the tsunami warning system, the All Hazard Alert Broadcast (AHAB) siren system was tested today. Following the statewide Drop, Cover, and Hold Drill at 10:15 a.m., the AHAB sirens were activated using the actual warning tone and the standard voice test message. Preliminary results for today’s drill are:

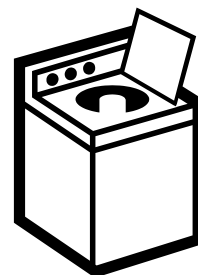
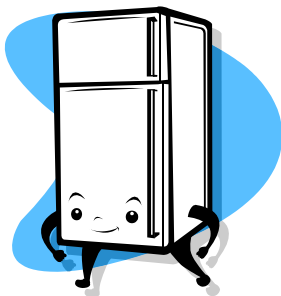

AQUATIC HERBICIDE TREATMENT BUSINESS AND RESIDENTIAL NOTICE

DISTRIBUTION DATE: SEPTEMBER 24, 2010

Surfside's Main Canal, Skating Lake, and Sea Breeze Lake will be treated with Aquatic Herbicides to control invasive plants species Eurasian watermilfoil and White Water Lily. **The treatment will begin on or about OCTOBER 4, 2010** (Weather Dependent). Additional treatments may be made **if required** the week of October 11th - October 15th. Treatments **will not** take place around Holiday Weekends.

The Products that may be applied are Renovate, Renovate Max G, Sculpin G, DMA*4 IVM and/or Rodeo Aquatic Herbicides. For Renovate (active ingredient is triclopyr TEA): Do not use treated water for irrigation or domestic purposes until herbicide levels at the intake are undetectable. The WA Department of Health recommends a 12-hour restriction regarding re-entry to treated waters. Renovate Max G (active ingredients are triclopyr TEA and 2,4-Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid, dimethylamine salt): Do not use treated water for irrigation or domestic purposes until herbicide levels at the intake are undetectable. The WA Department of Health recommends a 12-hour restriction regarding re-entry to treated waters. Rodeo (active ingredient is Glyphosate): There are no swimming or recreation restrictions or advisories when using this product. Sculpin G and DMA*4 IVM (active ingredient is 2, 4-Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid, dimethylamine salt): It is advised that no swimming occur within the treated area during or for 24 hours following treatment. Do not use water for irrigation for 72 hours.

The Locations of treatments will be within the Milfoil and White Water Lily infested areas of the Main Canal, Sea Breeze Lake and Skating Lake.

Treated and potentially affected areas of will be *posted with caution signs the day before and/or day of application.* The signs will describe any water use restrictions TO BE FOLLOWED within the POSTED AREAS ONLY.

If you are withdrawing water for potable or domestic use, livestock watering or irrigation and have **no** alternative water source please contact the applicator AquaTechnex, LLC at 360-330-0152 to arrange an alternative water supply.

If you would like to request additional notification prior to treatment, or have further questions, please contact AquaTechnex using the information above.

This herbicide treatment is regulated under a permit from the Washington State Department of Ecology.

South Bend, Washington – The Pacific County Emergency Management Agency is coordinating a NOAA Weather Radio Promotion on Saturday, September 25, 2010, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Customers will be able to purchase a NOAA weather radio and have it programmed on site by amateur radio operators. Participating locations are:

- *South Pacific County*

Weather radios alert local residents to many immediate, life-threatening hazards, like weather, tsunamis, volcanoes, hazardous releases, and other dangerous events. Without a weather radio, a critical emergency warning message from local emergency authorities could be missed.

NOAA Weather Radio is a service of the National Weather Service, a part of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the U.S. Dept of Commerce. NOAA Weather Radio is the voice of the National Weather Service, broadcasting the latest area weather forecasts and conditions 24 hours a day. Why Weather Radios?

Do you have a smoke detector? Of course - it alerts you when it detects smoke. Weather radios alert you to many other immediate, life-threatening hazards in your area, like weather, tsunamis, volcanoes, hazardous releases, and other dangerous events.

Without a weather radio, you could miss a critical warning message from local emergency authorities that could save your life and those in your family.

How do they work?

NOAA/ NWS (National Weather Service) broadcasts conditions 24-hours a day, 7-days a week. They behave similar to smoke detectors—silently monitoring and then alerting you with initial warning messages, so you will have more time to respond.

- Marine Storm Warning
- Major Flood Warning
- Flash Flood Watch & Warning
- Tidal Flood Warning
- Winter Storm Warning
- Blizzard Warning
- Severe Thunderstorm Watch & Warning

- Tsunami Watch & Warning
- Volcanoes & Lahars
- Enemy Attack
- Nuclear Accident
- AMBER Child Abduction Alerts
- Dam Failures
- Secondary Hazards from Terrorism or Earthquakes
- Other Hazardous Events including Chemical Releases



Outlooks, Watches, Warnings, Advisories

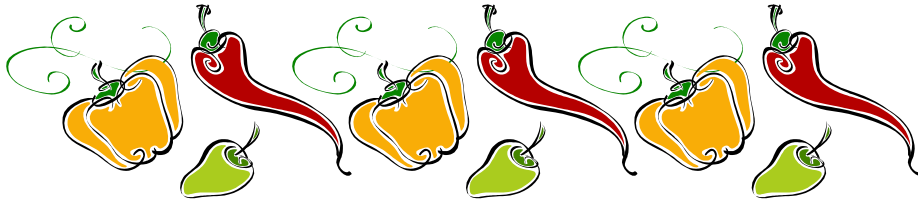
The NWS issues flood and weather *Outlooks, Watches, Warnings, and Advisories* in the effort to help protect lives and property.

- **Outlook** - Heads Up! Issued up to 5 days in advance of the potential hazardous flood or weather event.
- **Watch** - Get Prepared! Usually in effect 12-48 hours prior to the potential event – the risk has increased.
- **Warning** - Take Action! In effect within 12 hours of an imminent or occurring flood or weather event.
- **Advisory** - In effect within 12 hours of a less serious flood or weather event that can cause significant inconvenience.

**SURFSIDE REGULAR BOARD MEETING
BOARD ACTION SUMMARY
SEPTEMBER 18, 2010**

SAFETY: Safety is always number one in Surfside. President Jim Flood expressed safety in the home as well as the workplace. The use of cell phones while driving is a violation, but people should also consider talking on a cell phone while walking on local streets. Be conscious of your surroundings when using cell phones and similar devices.

UPDATE ON VOLUNTEER/STAFF APPRECIATION DINNER: The dinner has been scheduled for Saturday, December 11, 2010 at the Peninsula Senior Center in Klipsan, same as last year. The hours of the event are 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm. All volunteers and staff are encouraged to attend. More information on the event will follow later.



2011 BOARD GOALS: The Board discussed the current goals in place and adding new goals for the upcoming year. The Board made some changes in the current goals, to include having the pedestrian bridges inspected yearly by the Water/Field Services staff and once every five years by a licensed engineer. In the Financial section, it was suggested that we budget funds appropriate for services provided. In Operations, recommendations for additions included maintaining compliance with all State regulations and water quality, evaluate the need for more electrical spaces at the RV Lot, streamline operations at the Water/Field Services Department, continue with the development of our Safety Program Plan and clean up the canal, which will include keeping our water levels at the appropriate level to control invasive vegetation. It was also suggested that an Ad Hoc Committee be created to review wages and salaries.

RV STORAGE LOT AGREEMENT: The Board discussed regulation language for use of the RV Lot. The agreement was revised to include the requirement for current liability insurance and license/registration. This requirement was adopted as part of the Operations Manual earlier this year, so now has been added to the agreement for the RV Lot use by members.

APPROVAL FOR USE OF CONTINGENCY FUNDS: The Board voted unanimously to approve use of contingency funds for the purchase of a chlorination pump at the well site. This will improve water quality to our members.

Updates from each of the standing committees were provided. These Committee Reports will be added to the items for review by members on the Surfside Homeowners Association website at www.surfsideonline.org. The Weekender will be enhanced to include more information on Committee actions throughout the month in order to keep members apprised of activities and accomplishments by Committee and Board Trustees assigned to the various committees.
