Financial Report by Rudd Turner, Trustee and Treasurer

Income: During January – April 2020 (4 months), \$1,537,894 or 88.9% of member fees have been received with \$191,905 still owed to make the total SHOA budget of \$1,729,799. This compares with 88.6% paid at this time last year. Miscellaneous revenues = \$49,964, which is on track to meet this year's Operational offset. The EIDL forgivable loan Advance of \$10,000, received in April, is in addition to these income amounts.

<u>Expenditures</u>: 4 months' Operational expenditures were \$486,983, or 32.1% of budget. The 2020 budgeted Capital Reserve contributions of \$343,016 were made to Reserve accounts in January.

SHOA finances continue to be strong at this time. This includes the month of April while Governor Inslee's "Stay Home, Stay Healthy" Proclamation has been in effect. That is good news for Surfside. The drinking water system, trash disposal, financial management, and a new deputy patrol contract with Pacific County are high Operational priorities. The Trustees continue to monitor financial status and will adjust programs if needed in the coming weeks and months.

Your continued support of our community by volunteering and paying member fees is much appreciated. The 3% credit card charge has been suspended in order to facilitate remote fee payments. Payment plans are available to spread out costs. Late payment penalties will not be charged for April and May. Feel free to contact the business office at 360-665-4171 to discuss payments.

Fishing is open in the Canals and Lakes. Just remember—no fishing from the bridges.

COMPACTOR SITE NEWS

The SHOA Compactor Site is open during this "Stay Home, Stay Healthy" period. Trash volume is increasing, due to members being home more and working on projects. In order to utilize disposal areas efficiently, please:

- (1) <u>Completely</u> flatten cardboard,
- (2) <u>Bag</u> your trash before placing it in the compactor, and
- (3) <u>Crush</u> recyclable plastic and aluminum containers.

Also when using the site:

- (1) <u>Respect</u> the 6 foot social distancing standard,
- (2) <u>Display</u> your pass so the attendant can see it, and
- (3) Dispose of trash and depart <u>quickly</u> to minimize the number of people within the site.

<u>**Daily</u>** trash limits: Compactor, two 45-gallon bags or equivalent, per member. Large Drop Box, same limit. The disposal of hazardous materials is strictly prohibited.</u>

Let's keep SHOA staff and members alike **SAFE** at this time.



Program Overview

The Neighborhood Watch Program is a crime prevention Program. It relies on communications among members of the communities – observations of the surrounding neighborhoods and the awareness of all, to what is and is not normal. Together it forms a secure network of eyes and ears which help the local Sheriff's department keep alert to the ever changing security needs of the community.

Objectives of the Neighborhood Watch Program

- 1. Prevent crime by improving security, increasing alertness, and creating and maintaining a caring community in an effort to reduce crime.
- 2. Promptly report suspicious and criminal activity, thus assisting law enforcement in detecting and preventing crime.
- 3. Observe the area for out of the normal activities and reporting them in order to catch a trend before it becomes a problem.
- 4. Share information among Watch members allowing a more caring community. Participate in general and Team meetings, optional training opportunities, newsletters, emails, Web presentations with a Facebook group.
- 5. Get to know the people who live in the area and the challenges they may have. Allow others to know what special needs may be warranted in case of community emergencies.
- 6. Help make it better for all of us to be able to go away for a short visit, or longer periods of time, by knowing that our properties are not left completely exposed to the criminal elements and are being watched out for by our friends and neighbors.

Benefits of a Neighborhood Watch Program

- 1. Enhanced feeling of community by knowing your neighbors.
- 2. Community Watch and Law Enforcement are able to maintain a higher level of security for property owners and visitors alike.
- 3. Create a safer neighborhood and community due to everyone having a better understanding of our neighborhood, the local crime situation, and looking out for each other.

Surfside's volunteer-run Firewise Chipping Program has been available during the summer months to members for many years. Unfortunately, this year is different. In March 2020, in response to state and county orders to manage the spread of COVID19, Surfside announced cancellation of all non-essential activities, including all committee meetings, until further notice. This ban included the Firewise Chipping Program.

Our primary concern is for the safety of members and volunteers, as well as the availability of commercial vendors that support this program. We are waiting for further directions from the State and County Officials on lifting the stay at home ban. Surfside will continue to monitor and assess the potential opening of the Chipper Site for member use during summer 2020. Until then, dumping any material at the site is prohibited.

Noxious & Invasive Weeds: Drainfield, Pathway, Garden, and Yard Intruders

INVASIVE PLANT OR TREE ROOTS LIKE BAMBOO CAN CLOG SEPTIC DRAINFIELD LINES, DRAINAGE OR CULVERT PIPES CAUSING THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS TO REPAIR OR REPLACE

NOXIOUS AND INVASIVE SPECIES

Many plants thrive in our mild coastal environment. Unfortunately, some species spread far and wide from their initial planting beds, invading surrounding property and damaging drainfields, fences, paths or yards.

NOXIOUS WEEDS

Noxious species are classified in Washington state as A, B or C. <u>Class A</u> noxious weeds are very limited in their distribution, and the goal is to prevent them from gaining a foothold in Washington.

By law, all <u>Class A</u> noxious weed plants must be eradicated (eliminated). In our area, Spartina (Smooth Cordgrass) is an example of a Class A noxious weed. <u>Class B</u> noxious weeds are nonnative, invasive species that are abundant in some areas of the state, but absent or limited in other areas. Gorse or Scotch Broom are examples of a Class B weed. <u>Class C</u> noxious weeds meet the criteria of noxious weeds but are typically so widespread that there is no realistic hope of eradicating them. Evergreen Blackberry and yellow flag iris are examples of this class.

INVASIVE WEEDS

Invasive species are ones that are nonnative and which thrive and spread aggressively outside their natural range. Some invasive species can become serious problems that threaten water quality, drive away native wildlife, crowd out native plants and create fire hazards. English ivy, and bamboo are common invasive species in Surfside.

Each year, Surfside owners find they face expensive repair or replacement of septic drainfield systems due to invasive weeds or tree roots.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Eliminate these plants in your yard or over your septic drainfield area.
- Plant native species to control the spread of non-native species
- Replace invasive species (i.e. Butterfly bush) with a non-invasive alternative (i.e. Korean lilac).
- Help prevent the spread of noxious and invasive weeds by cleaning shoes after hiking trails that may have seeds or runners.



Class A: Spartina (Cordgrass) A rhizomatous, perennial grass, 2 to 4 feet tall. TThe plant is deciduous; its stems die back.



Class B: Gorse Thousands of seed pods, with spiky thorns.



Class C: Yellow Flag Iris Yellow flag iris is an invasive perennial. Contact wi its resins can cause skin irritation in humans.

Architectural Committee
