# **BURN BAN STILL IN EFFECT**

## Update Pacific County Requirements—Road Standards (REQUIRED CULVERTS FOR NEW RESIDENTIAL DRIVEWAYS)

Road approach shall have a pipe across the approach, minimum 12" diameter, minimum 1' of cover, minimum 0.5% slope. If required, install a small ditch along the frontage in this area using the standard details in Appendix K of the Road Standards to tie into the cross-driveway culvert with an invert on the bottom of the ditch and 3:1 beveled end sections. Allowable pipe materials include plain and reinforced concrete pipe, corrugated or spiral rib aluminum pipe, corrugated steel pipe with aluminized or galvanized treatments (1, 2, or 5), spiral rib steel pipe with aluminized or galvanized treatments (1, 2, or 5), ductile iron (water supply, Class 50 or 52) pipe, lined corrugated polyethylene (CPE) pipe, polypropylene pipe (PP), polyvinyl chloride (PVC) pipe (min. 3 ft of cover in the Right of Way), or high-density polyethylene pipe (HDPE; including solid wall polyethylene pipe). Other materials may be used on request when specifically approved by the

County Engineer. Please call for a final inspection at (360) 875-9368 when the culvert and/or ditch is installed.

have a means to transport it to their property, we offer delivery for \$100 per trailer trip (each trailer contains approximately 6-7 yards of material). # PROPER MULCHING

Mulch is a newly planted tree's best friend because it:

- Insulates the soil, helping to provide a buffer from heat and cold.
- Retains water to help the roots stay moist.
- Keeps weeds out to avoid root competition.
- Prevents soil compaction.
- Reduces lawn mower damage.

## Steps to Adding Mulch Around Your Tree

- 1. Remove any grass within a 3-foot area (up to 10 feet for larger tree).
- 2. Pour natural mulch such as wood chips or bark pieces 2 to 4 inches deep within the circle.
- 3. Keep the mulch from touching the trunk of the tree.

# Tell me about RVs...

### <u>RV Storage</u>

If you are renting a storage space for your RV at the Surfside HOA storage facility you will receive a statement for renewal by the end of this month. If you will not rent your space for the new year, please call or visit the office so we can list those spaces as vacant and available for other members to use. If you want to keep your space, return the invoice with your payment as soon as possible. **RV gate keys for the new year will be available after November 1<sup>st</sup>.** 

#### <u>RV Use</u>

**October 31<sup>st</sup> marks the end of the summer RV season.** Unless your lot is exempt per the covenants, RVs must be removed by October 31<sup>st</sup>. In the winter, November 1<sup>st</sup> to March 14<sup>th</sup>, you can use a RV winter permit for up to 60 days. The winter permit is issued for up to 21 days at a time and cannot exceed 60 days total. While using a winter permit **you must be actively occupying the RV**, meaning you must be in it each night. No full-time RV residency is allowed on any lots. If you need a winter permit call or visit the office.

### <u>RV Fines</u>

At the August 20, 2022 regular meeting, the Board of Trustees increased the fines for RVs left on lots during the winter season (November 1<sup>st</sup> – March 14<sup>th</sup>). If you receive a violation notice, you have 10 days to correct the violation by removing your RV from your lot. If not corrected within the 10-day timeline, fines will begin on the 11<sup>th</sup> day. **Fines start at \$25 a day for the first 30 days, then go to \$75 a day beginning on the 31<sup>st</sup> day.**

# Vegetation Spotlight



# SALAL (Gaultheria shallon)

Our native *Salal* is so common and adaptable to our region that it tends to be overlooked if not totally ignored by the gardener; but it definitely deserves a second look. It is a lush shrub, growing typically 3-6 feet tall, forming thickets (good bird habitat) in shade or partial shade.

The leaves are somewhat large (2-4" long x 1-3" wide), with an almost reptilian texture of the richest green hue. The flowers, that are abundant in spring and early summer, are clusters of drooping bell-shaped white-to-pinkish flowers, delicate and lovely in contrast to the tougher-looking foliage.

The blue-black berries that follow were at one time a staple food of the native people of this region and can be a tasty berry to make into jelly or jam. Or, simply left in place to provide food for visiting birds to your garden. As an evergreen, it provides color and texture to the winter garden, and year-round is relatively pest and disease free.

Salal grows best in partial shade, but is perfectly adaptable to a more open, south-facing sunny location as long as it has good drainage and a dampish root run; but because it can form a thicket it can become invasive.

Nevertheless, it is perfectly suited to a small garden if kept in check. For a thick ground cover, it is a much better choice than some more invasive and destructive non-natives. Easy to care for, once established, it can be a treasured foundation of the garden.

## Plan on installing a fence, a shed, a gazebo or building a garage or a house? REMINDER...

ALL building plans must be submitted to the Architectural Committee <u>prior</u> to any construction.

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. The building packets are on our website at <u>surfsideonline.org/forms/</u> or you can pick them up from the business office. Applications must be received by end of day on Thursdays to make the agenda for the following Tuesday's meeting.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

**Two (2) sets of plans must be submitted to the committee.** Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.

Download the Operations Manual and the Surfside Restrictive Covenants or call the business office 360-665-4171 with questions.
