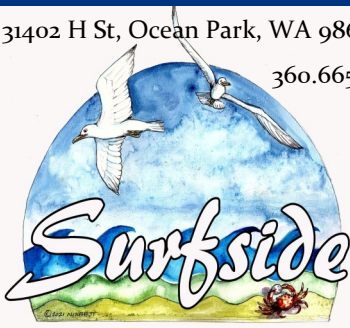

What happened?

On Wednesday, December 27th, we had a water main break near 303rd Place and M Place, an area containing old pipe and one where the Water Main Replacement (WMR) project has not been completed.

We believe the break was caused by heavy rainfall which shifts the sand and bends the pipes. The break directly impacted about six lots which lost access to water completely. However, the break *potentially* caused water contamination in other lines which affects the entire community. Therefore we issued a boil water advisory via Hyper-Reach, the Surfside website and our Facebook page as quickly as possible.



By Thursday morning those directly impacted by the main break had water restored through the creative efforts of our field crew. On the plus side, this event moved up our scheduled WMR repairs for the impacted area. The crew will work to replace the old pipe near 303rd Place and M Place and should be done next week. If you see them please give them plenty of space and honk your horn to say "Thanks"!

If you were in town this week, you know Wednesday was a wild day for weather with high winds and sideways rain. There were multiple emergencies in the community, including power outages, downed transformers and flooding. The entire workforce of the Peninsula did the very best jobs possible under these circumstances and our **heartfelt thanks goes out to all the emergency responders and others who worked through the night to keep us safe...**the Pacific County PUD, the Fire Department, the Sheriff's Department, the employees at Jack's, the staff of the Public Works Department, and of course, our HOA staff.

The Truth About Holiday Spirits

Many of us look forward to celebrations during the holidays, yet it is also a time when some people are more likely to drink beyond their limits than at other times of the year. Some people will experience adverse consequences that range from fights to falls to traffic crashes.

Alcohol's Effects Begin Quickly, Before You Know It!

People may not recognize that critical decision-making abilities and driving-related skills are already diminished long before they show overt signs of intoxication.

Initially, alcohol may appear to act as a stimulant, so people who drink may feel upbeat and excited. But don't be fooled. Alcohol decreases inhibitions and judgment and can lead to reckless decisions.

As people consume more alcohol, reaction times get longer and behavior becomes poorly controlled and sometimes even aggressive—leading to fights and other types of violence. Continued drinking causes the slurred speech and loss of balance that is typically associated with being drunk.

Alcohol can also cause blackouts—which are gaps in a person's memory while they were intoxicated. These gaps happen when a person drinks enough alcohol to temporarily block the transfer of memories from short-term to long-term storage—known as memory consolidation—in a brain area called the hippocampus. At higher blood alcohol concentration levels, alcohol acts as a clear depressant, which can cause people who drink to pass out if the dose is high enough. At even higher levels, people who drink face the danger of life-threatening alcohol overdose due to the suppression of vital life functions.

Even When Drinking Stops—Alcohol's Effects Do Not Stop

During an evening of drinking, it's easy to misjudge how long alcohol's effects last. For example, many people believe that they will begin to sober up—and be able to drive safely—once they stop drinking and have a cup of coffee. The truth is that alcohol continues to affect the brain and body long after the last drink has been finished. Even after someone stops drinking, alcohol in the stomach and intestine continues to enter the bloodstream, resulting in impaired judgment and coordination for hours.

Before You Celebrate—Plan Ahead

Of course, we don't intend to harm anyone when we celebrate during the holiday season. Yet, violence and traffic fatalities associated with alcohol misuse persist, and myths about drinking live on—even though scientific studies have documented how alcohol affects the brain and body.

Because individuals differ, the specific effects of alcohol on an individual will vary. But certain facts are clear—there's no way to make good decisions when you are intoxicated, and there's no way to sober up faster.

So, this holiday season, do not underestimate the effects of alcohol. Don't believe you can beat them, or they may beat you. Think before you drink.

Here are some tips to keep in mind if you host a holiday gathering:

- Offer a variety of alcohol-free drinks—water, juices, sparkling sodas. Alcohol-free drinks help counteract the dehydrating effects of alcohol. Also, the other fluids may slow the rate of alcohol absorption into the body and reduce the peak alcohol concentration in the blood. They also provide your guests with alternatives to alcohol.
- Provide a variety of healthy foods and snacks. Food can slow the absorption of alcohol and reduce the peak level of alcohol in the body by about one-third. Food can also minimize stomach irritation and gastrointestinal distress the following day.
- Help your guests get home safely—use designated drivers and taxis. Anyone getting behind the wheel of a car should not have ingested any alcohol.
- If you are a parent, understand the underage drinking laws—and set a good example.



Pacific County Emergency Notification System



Surfside uses this system to notify members of a water main break and boil water advisories. We also send a second notification through Hyper-Reach indicating when a boil water advisory has been lifted.

When signing up for Hyper-Reach make sure to select **Surfside** as your municipality, not Ocean Park or Long Beach. We do not send notices to any other locations. Also, if you would like to receive notifications regarding weather emergencies impacting our area, check the **weather alert box**.

YOU MUST SHOW YOUR COMPACTOR PASS TO THE ATTENDANT.

A reminder...

We only accept household trash at the compactor site. This is typically standard "garbage," not carpet, construction, appliances, or flammable materials. If you have questions, the attendants are happy to answer – but please remember, they are trained on what items are and are not acceptable to put in the compactor. If they say an item you bring for disposal or recycling is not acceptable, please respect their expertise and take the unacceptable item back home with you.

All non-household items can be taken to the Peninsula Sanitation Transfer Station at 4404 67th Place in Long Beach. The transfer station is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm and on Saturdays from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. They are closed on Sunday. The fee is \$25 for a truckload up to 320 lbs.

Vern, the primary compactor attendant, had a great idea. It seems everyone has something they want to get rid of, so he suggests talking to your neighbors and planning a "dump run." Neighbors can share the load and the cost. This is a great way to get to know your neighbors and help each other while also disposing of items you no longer want.

Employee Superheroes

You see them on the side of the road, you see them in an emergency, and sometimes you see them at your front door offering help. Who are these employee superheroes? It's our very own Aquamen - Aaron Brooks, Chris Staudenraus, and Jason (Jake) Taylor.

The members of the water and field crew are responsible for maintaining the water mains and the water meters. They provide new water hook up services. They are key personnel on large projects like updating old water main lines. This is commonly called the WMR (water main replacement). In short, the crew does whatever is needed whenever we need them to do it!

The water and field crew is indispensable to the smooth operation of our community. They support the health and well-being of all members by maintaining the transport systems for clean water...and they do it all behind the scenes with little to no interruption in service.

Jake has worked with us since early 2019. Chris has been with us since 2010. The Field Crew Leader, Aaron, has over 13 years with the HOA. That kind of loyalty is hard to find these days.



FILLING SANDBAGS...MADE EASY

Filling sandbags is often an arduous, tedious task but no more! The Emergency Management Committee purchased an *ExpressBagger®* to simplify the task.

Who ya gonna call?

Covenant Corner

The business office fields lots of phone calls and in-person questions about the HOA covenants, the majority of which we handle efficiently and with good humor. But sometimes we get questions we have to pass on to other county or state entities. Here is a short list of who to call when your question relates to an issue outside of our restrictive covenants.

- ◇ **Trespassing**—If someone is accidentally or purposefully accessing your lot from the street or from the beach, call the **Sheriff's non-emergency number** and report it, **360-642-9397**.
- ◇ **Drug sales or drug use**—if you have suspicions there are drug deals happening in your neighborhood or you have evidence of blatant drug use, contact the **Pacific County Drug Task Force** and report it. The south tip line is **360-642-9300 x 2847** and their email is dtf@co.pacific.wa.us.
- ◇ **Vehicular accidents/road hazards**—if you witness an accident or erratic driving, or there are unmarked road hazards, yep, you guessed it, call the **Sheriff's non-emergency number**.
- ◇ **Smoke/Fire**—If you question the size of an open burn pit or campfire, contact the **Fire Department's non-emergency number (360) 665-4451**.
- ◇ **Vehicles parked on the roadside**—depending on your neighborhood the county may own up to 60' of "roadway", both the asphalt and the utility right of way. If there is an *unknown* vehicle parked on the side of the road for more than a week and it does not belong to your neighbor or a guest, [send a comment/concern form](#) to **Pacific County Code Enforcement**.
- ◇ **Illegal dumping**—take photos and notate the correct location and if visible, address of the lot, then [send a concern form](#) to **Pacific County Code Enforcement**.
- ◇ **Septic failures**—you might want to call your neighbor first, but then [send a concern form](#) to **Pacific County Code Enforcement**.
- ◇ **Dead Wildlife**—this depends on where the animal is located. If there is a dead animal on your property you are responsible for dealing with it. If the animal is in the roadway or the right of way, you can call **Pacific County Dispatch, 360-875-9397**. If the animal is on the **beach** call **360-642-9397**.
- ◇ **Dangerous Wildlife**—not all injured animals are dangerous and unfortunately, the deer in our community are in conflict with vehicles frequently. If there is a dangerous situation, like an injured bear or coyote, call the **Department of Fish and Wildlife Enforcement, 360-902-2936, Option 1**.
- ◇ **Injured Wildlife**—there are some local rescue groups whose information you can find online. You may also [submit an "observation"](#) to the **Department of Fish and Wildlife**.
- ◇ **Feeding Bears**—it is *illegal* to feed bears. If you witness this occurring call the **Department of Fish and Wildlife Enforcement, 360-902-2936, Option 1**. It is not illegal to feed deer, raccoons, etc. but it is unhealthy and potentially life threatening for wild animals to consume human food.

Safety and Security Committee Year End Update

The Committee is working on your behalf to make Surfside a safer community. Here are some of the highlights from 2022.

- ⇒ **LAW ENFORCEMENT** - The committee contacted WSP to ask for patrols in Surfside. We sent a letter of request to Pacific County asking for more deputies to patrol Surfside. You may have noticed an increase in the number of patrols. We also contacted Washington US Representative Jaime Herrera-Beutler, who sent the District Director of Issues Aide, to look into releasing funds to train and hire more deputies. We facilitated contact between the aide and Sheriff Souvenir. The committee looked into the possibility of an outside contract with the Long Beach Police Department, but their city council denied the request due to legal issues. The committee is also in contact with Sheriff-Elect Daniel Garcia. We've outlined our requests and feel encouraged and hopeful by his responses.
- ⇒ **TRAFFIC CALMING** - Another letter with requests was sent to the Pacific County Commissioners. We highlighted speeding in Surfside and listed specific problem areas. They forwarded our letter to the Department of Transportation Road Engineer, who we invited to come to our monthly meeting as a speaker. The community will soon have new signs, and this small step will progress to actual road restructuring in an attempt to slow traffic. Please be patient as these types of improvements can take up to two years. The department is pursuing a grant to fund our requests.
- ⇒ **CHAMBER OF COMMERCE** - In the new year, we will work with the Ocean Park Chamber of Commerce on the mutual goal of consistent and visible law enforcement on the northern end of the peninsula. We hope two strong voices will prove influential.
- ⇒ **E-BIKES** - After complaints from residents about unsafe conditions on beach pedestrian paths, signs were added to trails warning members and guests that e-bikes are not allowed on any pedestrian access paths. We also provided education to our members through articles in the Weekender. As Surfside continues to evolve and grow we must implement safety measures so humans, pets, wildlife and vehicles do not collide.
- ⇒ **RELATIONSHIPS** - We are following the progress of the newly formed Surfside Area Neighborhood Watch and lending support as needed. We worked with other committees on the Wild-fire Management Plan. The committee provided support to both the business office and the water department to update their Pre-Fire Emergency Evacuation Plans.
- ⇒ **DISPATCH**- There was an explosion early this year and so many people called the sheriff the system was overloaded. We found out the existing system, from the 70's, is antiquated. The committee is researching solutions which may help in future emergencies. Our goal is a quicker response time for the peninsula. Time saved equals lives saved.

Please remember to call and report all incidents to the Sheriff or Drug Task Force. Data is vital in obtaining grants, and grant funding will help the community reach our goals.

HOLIDAY ROAD TRAVEL SAFETY TIPS

If you are planning trips over the holidays here are some safety tips to consider.

- * Make sure your car is in good condition for a road trip. Check the tires for wear and pressure, including the spare. Check the oil level. Check all the fluids (brake, transmission, washer, etc.).
- * Make sure your roadside assistance plans are up to date and you have the contact numbers.
- * Pack a vehicle emergency supply kit with things like jumper cables, a small tool kit, a flashlight with extra batteries and reflective triangles.
- * Put an emergency preparedness kit with things like water, food, a whistle, emergency blankets, a small radio and a first aid kit in your vehicle.
- * Always share your travel plans with a family member or friend.
- * Check the weather before departing and along your route. Consider alternate plans to travel around any storms or weather hazards.
- * Get some sleep before you leave! Drivers should be well rested and alert.
- * Buckle up, slow down, and don't drive impaired...this includes driving while taking prescription medications which may limit your ability to stay alert.
- * Follow the rules of the road and use caution in construction zones.
- * Give your full attention to the road. Avoid distractions such as cell phones or argumentative conversations. Put your pets in crates or harnesses to keep them and you safe.
- * Make frequent stops if you are alone. If with others, rotate drivers during long trips. If you're too tired to drive, stop and get some rest.
- * If you have car trouble, pull off the road as far as possible.

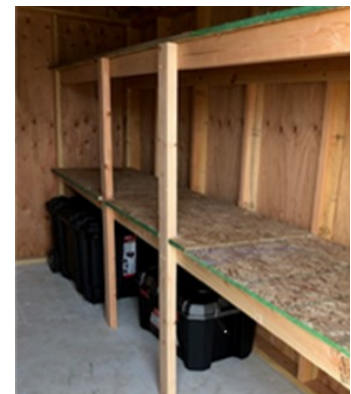

Have you ever pondered where or how your great-great grandparents lived or how their medical history might affect you?

Genealogy may help you uncover circumstances of their day-to-day lives, open doors to their relationships, status, possessions, professions, experiences, and possibly actual old photos; through wills, deeds, census data, and other valued archives. To properly build a family tree you need to know physical places to search, as well as how to search online. You need to know what data to trust, how to uncover obscure facts, issues with online genealogy programs, how to use DNA, and the value of family lore.

Sandra (Sandi) Melvin has lived the majority of her life on the Columbia River and the Long Beach Peninsula, however, she spent 18 years in the oil fields of Southeast Texas as a professional genealogical researcher searching for the rightful owners of mineral rights for various oil companies. She has served as president of the Clatsop County Genealogical Society, president of the Long Beach Genealogical Society, and numerous other historical societies and heritage museums.

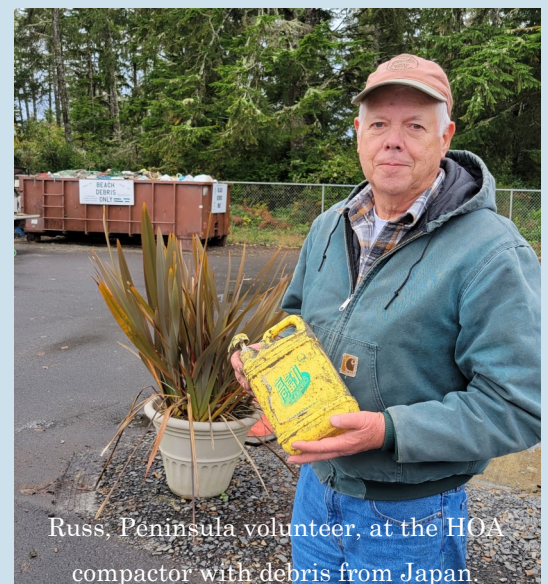

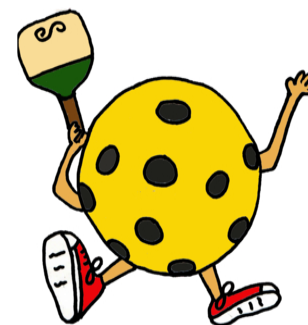

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. The building packets are on our website at surfsideonline.org/forms/ or you can pick them up from the business office. Applications must be received by end of day on Thursdays to make the agenda for the following Tuesday's meeting.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

Two (2) sets of plans must be submitted to the committee. Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.
