Member Motions at the Annual Meeting

If you want to make a motion at the Annual Meeting, please prepare the motion ahead of time. We will have a "Motions Desk" that you can submit your motion to. Motions will be typed up and displayed on the screen for the members to see. Please include your printed first and last name and your Surfside owned property.

Motions regarding covenants would be for the board to review. If the board pursues the change to the covenants, a special hearing would be scheduled so that the entirety of the membership is aware of the proposed change. The Board of Trustees would then vote on that change at the next regular board meeting after a hearing of the membership to discuss proposed changes.

ARTICLE VI Powers and Duties of Trustees - The board of trustees shall also have the power to adopt, amend and revise existing or additional restrictive covenants from time to time which shall be applicable to all club members and all property within Surfside Estates.

Did you get your notice? Surfside utilizes the Pacific County Emergency Notification System to notify members of water main breaks and boil water advisories.

Pacific County Hyper-Reach sends notifications by phone, text and email. Click the link below to sign up. You are sent 2 notifications, one alerting you to the boil water advisory and one advising the advisory has been lifted.

Surfside Healthy Waterways

Land, Buildings, and Waterways Committee

During the summer months, the waterways are at increased risk of developing algae blooms which can be toxic to humans, pets, and wildlife. While Surfside HOA has treated Seabreeze Lake for blue green algae in spring 2023, we need to remain vigilant for signs of algae proliferation. As homeowners, we play a big role in wetland protection and health. Protecting a wetland doesn't necessarily require additional effort; often times it is what we don't do that is most important.

Dumping or allowing yard debris into the waterways is detrimental to a safe and healthy aquatic environment. While yard waste is made up of natural materials that will eventually decompose, they can damage a wetland in the process. As they decompose, it causes oxygen depletion, and provides nutrients for the proliferation of blue-green algae. This results in a rotten egg smell and massive algae blooms during the summer.

Fertilizers also represent a potential threat to water sources by providing nutrients that allow blue green algae to thrive. Avoid using fertilizers adjacent to lakes, canals, and streams. Do not add more than the maximum amount posted by the manufacturer, which helps prevent the excess from running into the waterways, as well as saving the homeowner money.

Fires in Surfside

Summer is here and that means everyone is outside working on their

property. If you are considering clearing your lot, or cutting down trees you'll need to check in with Pacific County on land clearing permits or tree cutting permits. If contracting a business to do the work, please make sure they have secured the proper permits to prevent any fines from Pacific County.

In section 2.5 of the Surfside Restrictive Covenants, **Outdoor burning of land clearing debris or construction debris is prohibited.** Small (3-foot x 3 foot) campfires, cooking fires, and natural yard debris fires are permitted provided they meet the criteria for such uses adopted by the Pacific County Fire District #1, and meet the requirements of Section 5.8.

In section 5.8, Owners shall use their platted parcels in such a manner so as not to interfere with the health, safety, and comfort of other property owners. Intrusive lighting, noise, including loud, amplified music, boisterous parties, and smoke from fires that unreasonably interferes with others' enjoyment of life and property are not permitted.

As always, never leave an unattended fire burning.

Surfside has a chipping site available to all members in good standing, where you can take your limbs from tree trimming. The chipping site is located at 350th & G St., and is open Wednesdays and Saturdays from 10 am—2 pm. See page 6 for details on the chipping site.

Beware of Covering Your Fire with Sand

Peninsula Beachgoers! Covering your campfire with sand may appear convenient and effective, but it hides potential dangers.

The following are some hazards you should be aware of:

- Incomplete extinguishment: Covering a fire with sand may not fully extinguish it. Sand, unlike other fire suppression methods such as water or fire extinguishers, lacks the ability to suffocate flames completely. This means that even if it appears to be out, the fire could reignite and cause further damage or pose a risk to your safety.
- Hidden smoke and heat: Sand can insulate heat and trap smoke within its grains, giving an illusion of the fire being extinguished even when it's not. This can lead to serious consequences if you accidentally disturb the sand-covered fire, suddenly causing it to flare up.
- Delayed action: When you cover a fire with sand, it takes more time for the sand to work its way through to the fire's embers and extinguish them. This delay can lead to potential risks, especially when time is of the essence.

So what should you do instead?

Use water! Pouring water on a fire is one of the most effective ways to do it. Make sure to douse the flames thoroughly and keep an eye out for any smoldering areas.

OUTDOOR BURNING RESTRICTIONS IN PACIFIC COUNTY

Pacific County will be implementing burning restrictions (Burn Ban) **effective at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, July** 1st, **2023 until further notice.** Pacific County joins the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) in the implementation of these restrictions.

The burn ban applies to outdoor debris burning.

Recreational campfires are allowed if built in improved fire pits in designated campgrounds, such as those typically found in local, county, and state parks and in commercial campgrounds. On private land, recreational fires are permitted when built according to the following regulations:

- Recreational fires must be in a metal, stone, or masonry-lined fire pit such as those in improved campgrounds or available at home and garden stores.
- Size may not exceed 3 feet in diameter by 2 feet in height.
- Fires must be at least 25 feet from a structure or other combustible material and have at least 20
 feet of clearance from overhead fuels such as tree limbs, patio covers or carports.
- Fires must be attended at all times by a responsible person at least 16 years old who has the ability
 and tools to extinguish the fire. Tools include a shovel and either five gallons of water or a connected
 and charged water hose.
- Portable outdoor fireplaces, also known as patio fireplaces, designed to burn solid wood should not be operated within 15 feet of a structure or combustible material and must always be used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Completely extinguish recreational fires by covering them with water or moist soil and stirring with a shovel until all parts are cool to the touch.
- Self-contained camp stoves are a safe and easy alternative to campfires.



North Head Lighthouse Tours


May 10 @ 11:00 am - September 30 @ 3:00 pm—\$3

Tickets are \$3 per adult, Children 7-17 are free in the company of an adult (children under the age of 7 are too young to climb the tower)

The newly restored lighthouse is among Southern Washington's most photographed sights, and the light room on top offers spectacular views out to sea and of surrounding beaches and forests.

A Discover Pass (\$30 a year/ \$10 a day) is required to park in the lot at the lighthouse.

ALL building plans must be submitted to the Architectural Committee <u>prior</u> to any construction.

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. The building packets are on our website at <u>surfsideonline.org/forms/</u> or you can pick them up from the business office. Applications must be received by end of day on Thursdays to make the agenda for the following Tuesday's meeting.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

Two (2) sets of plans must be submitted to the committee. Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.
