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ALL OUTDOOR BURNING BANNED IN PACIFIC COUNTY

Pacific County is implementing stricter burning restrictions (a Burn Ban) effective at **12:01 a.m. on Friday, Aug. 18, 2023,** until further notice. Pacific County joins the Washington State Department of Natural Resources in implementing these restrictions.

All outdoor burning is banned. All recreational campfires or other burning is prohibited.

However, cooking stoves, barbecues, and recreational fire pits fueled by propane or gas with a shutoff valve are still allowed.

This burn ban comes as the county experiences record dryness. The most recent significant rainfall was in late April, four months ago.



- There may be some inexperienced teen drivers on the road taking siblings to school. You can be a good example for these new drivers by being patient and practicing safe driving.



What is sea foam?

Sea foam forms when dissolved organic matter in the ocean is churned up.

If you scoop up some water from the ocean in a clear glass and look at it closely, you'll see that it's chock full of tiny particles. Seawater contains dissolved salts, proteins, fats, dead algae, detergents and other pollutants, and a bunch of other bits and pieces of organic and artificial matter. If you shake this glass of ocean water vigorously, small bubbles will form on the surface of the liquid.

Sea foam forms in this way - but on a much grander scale - when the ocean is agitated by wind and waves. Each coastal region has differing conditions governing the formation of sea foams.

Algal blooms are one common source of thick sea foams. When large blooms of algae decay offshore, great amounts of decaying algal matter often wash ashore. Foam forms as this organic matter is churned up by the surf.

Most sea foam is not harmful to humans and is often an indication of a productive ocean ecosystem. But when large harmful algal blooms decay near shore, there are potential for impacts to human health and the environment. Along Gulf coast beaches during blooms of Karenia brevis, for example, popping sea foam bubbles are one way that algal toxins become airborne. The resulting aerosol can irritate the eyes of beach goers and poses a health risk for those with asthma or other respiratory conditions. Scientists studying the cause of a seabird die-offs off California in 2007 and in the Pacific Northwest in 2009 also found a soap-like foam from a decaying Akashiwo sanguinea algae bloom had removed the waterproofing on feathers, making it harder for birds to fly. This led to the onset of fatal hypothermia in many birds.

Tips on Water Use and Conservation

- Did you know a garden hose can use 10 gallons of water per minute? Use a broom instead of a hose to clean patios, walkways, and driveways.
- How "green" is your garden? By using native plants plants that are used to our climate you may be able to reduce your outdoor water use significantly.
- Does your lawn need watering? A good way to check is to just step on the grass. If it springs right back up, you may not need to turn on the sprinklers. When it's time to water, do it at dawn or dusk to reduce evaporation.
- Do not scalp lawns when mowing during hot weather. Taller grass holds moisture better. Grass should be cut fairly often, so that only 1/2 to 3/4 inch is trimmed off. A better looking lawn will result.
- Consider decorating some areas of the lawn with wood chips, rocks, gravel, or other materials now available that require no water at all.
- Water slowly for better absorption, and never water on a windy day.
- Fertilize lawns at least twice a year for root stimulation, but do not over-fertilize. Grass with a good root system makes better use of less water and is more drought-tolerant.
- Do not over-water. Soil can hold only so much moisture, and the rest simply runs off. A timer will help, and either a kitchen timer or an alarm clock will do. Apply only enough water to fill the plant's root zone. Excess water beyond that is wasted. One and a half inches of water applied once a week in the summer will keep most grasses alive and healthy.

A Message from your Water Department

Remember to shut off the main water supply to your home any time you're planning to be away for more than 24 hours. Yes, that includes weekend breaks. It's the best way to avoid serious water damage in the event of a plumbing failure. Water damage can result from frozen pipes, leaking supply lines, dripping water heaters, or other causes. Any damage will be greatly reduced by turning off the water before you go on vacation.

Potentially massive costs

Even if you're fully insured, you'll still be out of pocket once everything is dried out, cleaned, and replaced if necessary (highly likely). Not to mention the complete rewiring of the electrics, which is often also necessary. You never fully recover the costs.

The potential massive stress and inconvenience

While you're awaiting the insurance decision and the check, you may have to find rented accommodation. This adds to the inconvenience. Then there is the emotional stress of seeing family heirlooms, prized possessions, and memories all succumb to the water. It's a horrible feeling that no family wants to go through.

You can call and request your water to be shut off or turned on during the week with no charge.

Vandalism in the HOA

Vandalism, an act of willful destruction or defacement of property, has long been a concerning issue that affects communities, public spaces, and private property worldwide. Often driven by a combination of social, psychological, and environmental factors, vandalism has significant consequences for individuals, communities, and society at large.

- **Physical damage to property.** This element is probably the broadest. Physical damage can be anything from putting a sticker on a signpost to throwing bricks through storefront windows. Obviously, the severity and penalties for these different acts are taken into account, but they all fall under the category of vandalism.
- That property is owned by someone else. In order for an act to be considered vandalism, the property has to be owned by someone else either publicly or privately. You can't commit vandalism by, say, covering your own fence in graffiti. You might get in trouble with your HOA or frustrate your neighbors, but for it to be vandalism, the property that was damaged, defaced, or otherwise marred has to be owned by someone else.
- The damage was intentional. Let's say you're painting your house and accidentally spill some paint on your neighbor's fence. While you're legally obligated to make amends — financially or otherwise — you have not committed vandalism. The damage needs to be intentional to qualify.

This year Surfside Homeowners Association has experienced several acts of vandalism on Surfside property. Specifically the restrooms at multiple cabanas. In the cabana at Skating Lake someone dumped dirt and bark down the toilet and at the business office the men's restroom fell victim to "tagging" more than once this year as well as a wall being knocked down. These acts cost the entire membership money.

Each time we have to shut the cabanas down this prevents you, the members from using the facilities and creates an inconvenience to all who rely on the use of the cabana restrooms.

If you see any vandalism in progress please call 911 and notify the office but do not try to stop it yourself. If you come across signs of vandalism please call the office to report it. We will send someone out to evaluate the damage and start the repairs.

ALL building plans must be submitted to the Architectural Committee <u>prior</u> to any construction.

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. The building packets are on our website at <u>surfsideonline.org/forms/</u> or you can pick them up from the business office. Applications must be received by end of day on Thursdays to make the agenda for the following Tuesday's meeting.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

Two (2) sets of plans must be submitted to the committee. Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.
