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Important message to all Surfside Members. Please take the time to read.

I write to share that currently under consideration before the Washington House of Representatives is a bill that changes the current RCWs for HOAs and other common property entities in the state of Washington. The bill has already passed the Senate and is likely to pass the House and be signed into law by the governor before the 2024 session expires.

The bill (SB5796) includes language that will require HOAs to release, based upon any member's request, the personal electronic addresses (email address) of all members.

If a member has requested the HOA to Not Share their personal electronic address (email address) then the HOA is required to redact any unlisted electronic address (personal email addresses) before releasing the member list.

In order to prepare for the passage of this bill, we are notifying all members about this change and inviting them to consider if they wish to have their personal email addresses released or be considered unlisted.

If you do not wish to have your personal email shared, as will be required if this bill becomes law, please send an email to office@surfsideonline.org or stop by the office where we can record your wishes.

Please know that once Surfside is required to release your personal email addresses, we will have no control as to how it will be shared or sold to other entities by another member.

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Surfside Website Security Update

A recent website security update was put into effect due to increased bogus user accounts being added to the website. We can scan for malware, malicious URLs and infections concerning the files, posts and comments on the website.

The most important part of this update involved passwords on the website's user accounts. A newly set requirement is as follows:

A new password must meet the following specific requirements to reach a required point score:

At least 12 characters.

At least one of each: uppercase letters, lowercase letters, numbers, symbols.

No character may be repeated 3 or more times.

No ordered numeric sequence of more than 2 characters is allowed (i.e. 123 or 321).

If you are using a password manager, you'll need to update that with the new password BEFORE you try to log on to the website.

Cape Disappointment State Park

Most of Cape Disappointment State Park will close from mid-**September 2024 through spring 2025**, specifically camping loops A, B, C and D and Waikiki Beach while the park undergoes renovations and repairs. This includes renovation of the park entrance, repair of erosion and water damage on the road to the campground, installation of a new trail and returning some areas to wetland habitat. This work will improve traffic flow through the park, improve campground safety, and provide more hiking opportunities.

Additionally, the restored wetland will improve the look of the park while protecting habitat for the birds and animals that live there – that means more birding and wildlife viewing. Parts of the park will remain open for day use. You are still welcome and encouraged to visit the Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center, boat launch, North Head Lighthouse and Beard's Hollow. The vacation homes (lightkeepers' residences) at Cape Disappointment and at neighboring Fort Columbia State Park will remain open.



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Local Flora and Fauna

Are you looking for native plants for your garden?

Washington Native Plant Society website is a great place for information on plants native to our area. They have detailed information for each county; Pacific County has 630 species of plants. Their mission is to promote the appreciation and conservation of Washington's native plants and their habitats through study, education, and advocacy.

American black bears (Ursus americanus) are the most common and widely distributed bears in North America. In Washington, black bears live in a diverse array of forested habitats, from coastal rainforests to the dry woodlands of the Cascades' eastern slopes. In general, black bears are strongly associated with forest cover, but they do occasionally use relatively open country, such as clearcuts and the fringes of other open habitat.

The statewide black bear population in Washington likely ranges between 25,000 and 30,000 animals. As human populations encroach on bear habitat, people and bears have greater chances of encountering each other. Bears usually avoid people, but when they do come into close proximity of each other, the bear's strength and surprising speed make it potentially dangerous. Most confrontations with bears are the result of a surprise encounter at close range. All bears should be given plenty of respect and room to retreat without feeling threatened.

Black widow spiders (Latrodectus species) are common to eastern Washington. A few small populations of black widows exist in western Washington. Adult female black widows have dangerous venom, but will often try to escape rather than bite, unless guarding their eggs. Female black widows are normally shiny black with a red hourglass marking on the underside of their abdomen. The marking can also be yellowish-orange and its shape can vary, resembling an hourglass, two marks, or a single dot. The body of an adult female is relatively large, about a half-inch long.

Black widow spiders prefer dark undisturbed areas, such as woodpiles, bales of hay, **water meter boxes**, under eaves, and fences. Indoors, they may be found in undisturbed, cluttered areas in basements, crawl spaces, or unused areas of garages. Female black widows build messy-looking webs in or behind objects in secluded and protected locations.





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2.0 Restrictions on Use of Platted Parcel:



2.9b RV Provisions Applicable to Certain Designated Lots - Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 2.9a, not more than one recreational vehicle is permitted to remain on a platted parcel listed below on a continuous basis but shall not be used as a permanent residence. All other covenants and guidelines for recreational vehicles in Section 2.9a must be followed.

- Division 8: Block 5, Platted Parcels 1-20 inclusive Block 6, Platted Parcels 1-20 inclusive
- Division 14: Block 4, Platted Parcels 3-16 inclusive Block 5, All Platted Parcels Block 6, All Platted Parcels Block 7, All Platted Parcels Block 8, All Platted Parcels Block 9, Platted Parcels 1-9 inclusive Block 10, Platted Parcels 1-10 inclusive
- Division 15: Block 2, Platted Parcels 18-28 inclusive Block 3, Platted Parcels 1-17 inclusive Block 4 through 9 inclusive, All Platted Parcels
- Division 16: All Platted Parcels
- Ocean Woods: All Platted Parcels
- **2.9c** Sewage and wastewater from recreational vehicles and/or tent sites must be disposed of as per Washington state regulations: i.e., these wastes shall not be dumped on the ground, in pits or in cesspools.
- **2.9d** All RV usage, parking, and storage shall occur outside of the County right-of-way, and shall adhere to the minimum setbacks for the Division within which the RV is being temporarily occupied
- **2.10** There shall be no manufacturing permitted upon a platted parcel without approval of the Board.
- 2.11 The type of business to be transacted on any commercial platted parcel must be approved by the Board.
- 2.12 Discharge of firearms and fireworks is prohibited.
- **2.13** Trail bikes and all motorized recreational equipment, licensed in accordance with state and county regulations, may be operated on designated roadways and driveways, but are prohibited in the dune areas and on platted parcels.
- 2.14 Rentals are a minimum of 30 days.
- **2.14a** Owners who use their property for long term rentals shall: 1) Require renters to sign a written rental/lease agreement containing a provision requiring compliance with Surfside covenants and including a current copy of Surfside covenants as an exhibit to the rental/lease agreement. 2) Notify the Association office of renter's name and contact information within 10 days of commencing rental or of any change of resident.
- **2.14b** Owners bear first and primary responsibility for compliance to Surfside covenants and shall cause renters to comply with Surfside covenants. Failure to cause compliance may result in enforcement action against the owner. Renters are responsible for complying with Surfside restrictive covenants and may also be subject to enforcement action.

Plan on installing a fence, a shed, a gazebo or building a garage or a house?

REMINDER...

ALL building plans must be submitted to the Architectural Committee <u>prior</u> to any construction.

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. The building packets are on our website at <u>surfsideonline.org/forms/</u> or you can pick them up from the business office. Applications must be received by end of day on Thursdays to make the agenda for the following Tuesday's meeting.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

Two (2) sets of plot plans must be submitted to the committee. Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.
