

#### SURFSIDE'S: Wildfire Fuel Reduction Demonstration Project (Work Continues)

The Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) provided trained, fire prevention crews, equipment, and reimbursable grant money to create a "demonstration project". The 315th trail was chosen for the demo project. Surfside owns the property adjacent to the trail. The trail has been severely eroded, noxious weeds were present, significant ladder fuel was present and access was difficult for maintaining the trail. Crews cleared ladder fuels, path erosion will be controlled and noxious weeds were removed. Surfside will provide signage to increase public awareness of fire hazard reduction efforts. All debris has been chipped, a large percentage has been placed on the path. DNR and PCFD#1 will return to train firefighters on firebreaks.

Just a reminder that there are no motorized vehicles or EBikes allowed on the walking paths to the beach. Please make sure your friends, family and guests are aware of this. Motorized vehicles and EBikes can use the Oysterville Rd Beach approach to drive onto the beach.

The law establishes three classes of e-bikes based on pedaling and speed capabilities. It also distinguishes use by riding surface. Class 1 and 2 e-bikes are allowed on paved - **but not natural surface** - trails unless otherwise specified by local land managers.

## Who ya gonna call?

#### Update: April 2024

The business office fields lots of phone calls and in-person questions about HOA covenants, the majority of which we handle efficiently and with good humor. But sometimes we get questions we have to pass on to other county or state entities. Here is a list of who to call when your question relates to an issue outside of our restrictive covenants.

- <u>Trespassing</u> If someone is accidentally or purposefully accessing your lot from the street or from the beach, call the Sheriff's non-emergency number and report it, <u>360-642-9397</u>.
- <u>Vehicular accidents/road hazards</u> If you witness an accident or erratic driving, or there are unmarked road hazards, yep, you guessed it, call the Sheriff's non-emergency phone number @ 360-642-9397.
- <u>Drug sales or drug use</u> If you have suspicions there are drug dealings happening in your neighborhood or have evidence of blatant drug use, contact the Pacific County Drug Task Force and report it. The south tip line is <u>360-642-9300 x 2847</u> their email is <u>dtf@co.pacific.wa.us</u>.
- <u>Smoke/Fire</u> If you question the size of an open burn pit or campfire, contact the Fire Department's nonemergency number @ 360-665-4451.
- <u>Vehicles parked on the roadside</u> Depending on your neighborhood the county may own up to 60' of "road & right of way" both the asphalt and utility right of way. If there is an *unknown* vehicle parked on the side of the road for more than a week and it does not belong to your neighbor or a guest, <u>send a comment/concern form</u> to Pacific County Code Enforcement, Travis Ostgaard <u>tostgaard@co.pacific.wa.us</u>
- <u>Illegal dumping</u> Take photos and notate the correct location and if visible, address of the lot, <u>send a</u> <u>comment/concern form</u> to Pacific County Code Enforcement at the contact information above.
- <u>Septic failures</u> You might want to call your neighbor first, but then <u>send a comment/concern form</u> again to Pacific County Code Enforcement at the contact information above.
- <u>Dead Wildlife</u> This depends on where the animal is located. If there is a dead animal on your property you are responsible for dealing with it. If the animal is in the roadway or right of way, you can call Pacific County Dispatch @ 360-875-9397. If the animal is on the beach call 360-642-9397.
- <u>Dangerous Wildlife</u> Not all injured animals are dangerous and unfortunately, the deer in our community are in conflict with vehicles frequently. If there is a dangerous situation like an injured Bear or Coyote, call Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife @ 360-902-2936 option 1.
- <u>Injured Wildlife</u> There are some local rescue groups whose information you can find online. You may also submit an "*Observation*" to the Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife.
- <u>Feeding Bears</u> It is *illegal* to feed Bears. If you witness this occurring call the Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife @ 360-902-2936 Option 1. It is not illegal to feed Deer, Raccoons, etc., but it is unhealthy and potentially life threatening for wild animals to consume human food.
- <u>Hunting</u> Hunting is legal in Surfside, but restricted due to the population density and danger to persons and property. If you experience a hunter, bow or rifle trespassing on your property contact Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife. Take photos for evidence if possible.

They look lovely don't they? The bright yellow flowers of the three plants pictured above would liven up any coastal garden. But don't be fooled by their appearance because these three are some of the most invasive plants in our community and we must eradicate them (per restrictive covenant 5.4 and state law RCW 17.10). Here's what Washington State recommends you do now to slow the spread of these noxious weeds:

- Conduct as much noxious weed control before plants flower and develop seed. If you do this earlier in the season, before the plants are finished growing, there will be less plant material to manage and dispose of.
- Fall and spring are the best times to control noxious weeds and establish native plants.
- Hand-pull weeds in the spring and fall when the soil is moist and roots are more easily removed. This is also a great time to reseed with annual grasses, since disturbing the soil can cause buried weed seeds to germinate.
- Control weeds when they are young. Seedlings and rosettes take less effort and resources to treat, whether you are tilling, hand-pulling, digging, tarping, or applying herbicide. Controlling before flowering means you don't have to worry about them setting seed that year.
- If you are unable to treat noxious weeds before they bloom, try to time control efforts after pollinators have visited and remove and discard flowerheads before they set seed if possible.
- Well-established infestations take longer to convert to desirable vegetation. It may be best to reseed with grass as a placeholder for the first few years. That way you can hand-pull or use a selective herbicide to treat any emerging weeds and then plant native, broadleaf species when the seed bank has been depleted.
- Composting is not recommended. Most home compost piles do not get hot enough to kill seeds or plants.

Native to Washington, western snowy plovers are listed as state endangered and as federally threatened under the Endangered Species Act. In 2023, the Washington population was estimated at fewer than 100 breeding adults and was dependent on birds immigrating to the state from Oregon.

Snowy plovers' range extends from the southern Washington coast to Baja, California. Grays Harbor and Pacific counties are the only places in Washington where these birds are currently found.

These birds do not migrate, instead spending their entire lives between the dune line and the high-tide line. Unlike many other bird species, snowy plovers do not build traditional nests.

#### Snowy plover breeding season runs from mid-April to mid-

**September**. During this time, WDFW asks all beach visitors to respect closure areas and signs indicating snowy plover nesting habitat. Please also avoid throwing food or trash on the beach, as this can attract predators, and follow the beach speed limit of 25 miles per hour.

## What Are Pollinators?

Put simply, pollinators move pollen from flower to flower and help plants reproduce. Many pollinators visit flowers in the pursuit of nectar and pollen for eating, but other pollinators are "incidental pollinators" that visit flowers in search of something else (like insect prey!)

While bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds are the most well-known pollinators, there are other important pollinators to be aware of. Some lesser known pollinators include:

Beetles, like fireflies and ladybugs, Wasps ... yes, they can be "good guys!", Mosquitoes Pro-tip: Only female mosquitoes drink blood, male mosquitoes pollinate flowers), Flies, including hoverflies, Ants, Birds, Bats, Rodents, and frogs.


In the larger food web, pollinators pollinate native plants and wildflowers that other birds and animals depend on. On a smaller scale, pollinators also help to boost the yields of garden plants, like squash and cucumbers. And as many gardeners can tell you, in the absence of pollinators, many of these plants won't fruit unless they're pollinated by hand with a Q-tip.

I could go on, but let's leave it with one final point. Pollinators preserve the genetic diversity of plants by cross-pollinating flowers. This helps safeguard food crops and other plants against diseases and pests that can affect a particular plant or plant cultivar.

One of the absolute best ways to help pollinators and increase pollinator activity in your garden is to plant flowers for bees and butterflies, as well as other insects. And the absolute best plants for pollinators? Native plants of course!

Native plants and wildflowers evolved side by side with native pollinators, which means they "know" what native pollinators want! Native plants are especially well-suited to the needs of native pollinators and studies have found that native plants are 4 times more attractive to native pollinators than non-natives.

# Covenant

#### 3.0 RESTRICTIONS ON TYPE OF STRUCTURES PERMITTED:

#### 3.2 Setbacks

**3.2c** For corner parcels, no structures shall be constructed closer than ten (10) feet to side property line abutting the road right-of-way. Front line determination for corner parcels will require Pacific County Building/Engineering Department verification.

**3.2 d** The following platted parcels are allowed a minimum setback of five (5) feet from the front property line. Division 2: Blocks 1-3 inclusive, All Platted Parcel Division 3: Block 3, Platted Parcels 1-13 inclusive Blocks 4-7 inclusive, All Platted Parcels Division 4: Block 2, Platted Parcels 1-10 inclusive Block 6, Platted Parcels 1-12 inclusive Block 7, Platted Parcels 1-4 inclusive Division 7: Block 1, Platted Parcels 1-6 inclusive Block 2, Platted Parcels 1-8 inclusive and 17-23 inclusive Block 3, Platted Parcels 1-6 inclusive Division 9: Block 10, Platted Parcels 5-11 inclusive Block 11, Platted Parcels 1-11 inclusive.

**3.2e** The following platted parcels require a 20-foot setback from the front property line. Division 20: Block 1, Platted Parcels 2-6 inclusive, 41-43 inclusive and 45 Tract A, Block 2, Platted Parcel 1

3.2f No structure, including fences, shall be constructed within 25 feet from the edge of the canals, lakes, or waterways within Surfside Estates.

**3.3 Height Limitations** Generally all single-family residences shall not exceed sixteen (16) feet in height. Specific exceptions to the 16-foot restriction are detailed by Exhibit "A" of these covenants.

**3.3b** In additions abutting Surfside, which are served under Surfside water contracts, and not listed in Exhibit "A" of these covenants, the building height and other restrictions in that addition shall be determined by that allowable for adjacent Surfside platted parcels.

**3.3c** Height limitations governing multi-family residences and all commercial structures shall be determined on a case-by-case basis by the Surfside Architectural Committee (hereinafter called the Committee), subject to approval by the Board.

# ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE

Plan on installing a fence, a shed, a gazebo or building a garage or a house? REMINDER...

ALL building plans must be submitted to the Architectural Committee <u>prior</u> to any construction.

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. **The plans MUST be submitted by Friday 2pm be added to the next week's agenda.** The building packets are on our website at <u>surfsideonline.org/forms/</u> or you can pick them up from the business office. Applications must be received by end of day on Thursdays to make the agenda for the following Tuesday's meeting.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

**Two (2) sets of plot plans must be submitted to the committee.** Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.
