Understanding Tsunami Alerts

Tsunami messages are issued by the <u>tsunami warning centers</u> to notify emergency managers and other local officials, the public and other partners about the potential for a tsunami following a possible tsunami-generating event. For U.S. and Canadian coastlines, these messages include alerts. There are four levels of tsunami alerts: warning, advisory, watch and information statement:

- Tsunami Warning: Take Action—Danger! A tsunami that may cause widespread flooding is expected or occurring. Dangerous coastal flooding and
 powerful currents are possible and may continue for several hours or days after initial arrival.
 Follow instructions from local officials. Evacuation is recommended. Move to high ground or inland (away from the water).
- Tsunami Advisory: Take Action—A tsunami with potential for strong currents or waves dangerous to those in or very near the water is expected or
 occurring. There may be flooding of beach and harbor areas. Stay out of the water and away from beaches and waterways. Follow instructions
 from local officials.
- Tsunami Watch: Be Prepared—A distant earthquake has occurred. A tsunami is possible.
 Stay tuned for more information. Be prepared to take action if necessary.
- Tsunami Information Statement: Relax—An earthquake has occurred, but there is no threat or it was very far away and the threat has not been
 determined. In most cases, there is no threat of a destructive tsunami.

Pacific County Hyper-Reach sends notifications by phone, text and email. Click the link below to sign up. You are sent 2 notifications, one alerting you to the boil water advisory and one advising the advisory has been lifted.



Preparing Homes for Wildfire



Landscaping and Maintenance: To reduce ember ignitions and fire spread, trim branches that overhang the home, porch and deck and prune large trees (depending on their height) 6 to 10' from the ground. Remove plants containing resins, oils and waxes and replace mulch in the immediate zone of 0 to 5 feet with crushed stone and gravel. Maintain vegetation annually.

Defensible Space



Clear any trees and brush that could obstruct the fire truck's path or reduce visibility of the driveway. Clear trees, branches, and brush from your driveway so that it is at least 12 feet wide and has at least 13.5 feet of vertical clearance to allow fire trucks access.



What do I do with the yard waste after cleaning up?

Firewood can be made from sticks and logs. The regulation of burning yard waste varies by location, so if you choose this option, make sure to check with PCFD1 for the appropriate burn permit.

 *Chipped yard waste is a sustainable alternative to landfilling, which reduces the environmental impacts associated with landfills it is a natural fertilizer.

30' to 60' Zone 3 Reduce Fuel Zone,

Landscaping – the goal here is not to eliminate fire but to interrupt fire's path and keep flames smaller and on the ground.

- Cut or mow grass down to a maximum height of 4 inches.
- Create horizontal space between shrubs and trees.
 Trees/clumps of trees should have a minimum of 18' between treetops.
- Remove ladder fuels (vegetation under trees) so a surface fire cannot reach the crowns. Prune trees up to six to ten feet from the ground; for shorter trees do not exceed 1/3 of the overall tree height.
- Remove fallen leaves, needles, twigs, bark, cones, and small branches.
- Structures separate from the main building, exposed wood piles, and storage tanks for Liquid Propane Gas and should have a minimum of 10 feet of clearance, down to bare mineral soil, in all directions. In addition to clearing the area around the propane tank, it is also important to ensure that the tank is professionally installed and maintained.

Maintaining the Trees on Your Property

- •Trees are permitted within the defensible space if the horizontal distance between the crowns of adjacent trees and the crowns of trees and, structures, overhead electrical facilities, or unmodified fuel is at or greater than 18 feet.
 •Portions of tree crowns that extend to within 10
- feet (3048 mm) of the outlet of a chimney shall be pruned to maintain a minimum horizontal clearance of 10 feet (3048 mm).
- Deadwood and litter should regularly be removed from trees.
- Remove dead or diseased trees (hazard trees) that have weakened or unstable roots and branches and are more likely to fall or break during high winds, heavy snow, or ice storms and cause damage to the structure or obstruct evacuation routes.

Seabreeze Lake—Update

Following the last treatment of Seabreeze Lake for toxic blue-green algae, some members of the Land, Buildings, & Waterways committee met with the contractor that has been working on our waterways. We did not receive the results we had expected after the last treatment. We had been treating Seabreeze with an algaecide, green-clean pro. Based on our discussions, it appears the algae has developed resistivity to the product.

The professional recommendation is to use a different approach. The recommended approach targets the nutrient load (essentially, eliminating the food source needed for algae to thrive). We will be using a product called EutroSORB, which is a phosphorus sequestering product. It works by binding to phosphorous in the water, effectively reducing its availability and thereby mitigating the negative impacts of excessive algae growth. As the product is removing the food source, the results may not be immediate but will continue to improve over time. This product is an all-natural, insoluble phosphorus filtration technology designed to remove phosphorus from water without impacting water quality or chemistry. Per the manufacturer, it is safe for fish, invertebrates, animals, and people.





Best Management Practices for Lakes:

Algae blooms can come from excess nutrients in the water. You can help keep local lakes healthy by taking the following steps:

- Maintain your septic system
- Manage waterfowl
- Use recommended landscape practices
- Control runoff and soil erosion
- Reduce or eliminate use of fertilizers
- Properly dispose of pet wastes
- Wash vehicles away from the lake
- Reduce or eliminate the use of pesticides

PRESS RELEASE OUTDOOR BURNING RESTRICTIONS IN PACIFIC COUNTY

Pacific County will be implementing burning restrictions (Burn Ban) effective at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, July 12th. 2025 until further notice.

The burn ban applies to outdoor debris burning.

Recreational campfires are allowed if built in improved fire pits in designated campgrounds, such as those typically found in local, county, and state parks and in commercial campgrounds. On private land, recreational fires are permitted when built according to the following regulations:

- Recreational fires must be in a metal, stone, or masonry-lined fire pit such as those in improved campgrounds or available at home and garden stores.
- Size may not exceed 3 feet in diameter by 2 feet in height.
- Fires must be at least 25 feet from a structure or other combustible material and have at least 20 feet of clearance from overhead fuels such as tree limbs, patio covers or carports.
- Fires must be attended at all times by a responsible person at least 16 years old who has the ability
 and tools to extinguish the fire. Tools include a shovel and either five gallons of water or a connected
 and charged water hose.
- Portable outdoor fireplaces, also known as patio fireplaces, designed to burn solid wood should not be operated within 15 feet of a structure or combustible material and must always be used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Completely extinguish recreational fires by covering them with water or moist soil and stirring with a shovel until all parts are cool to the touch.
- Self-contained camp stoves are a safe and easy alternative to campfires.

REMINDER...

ALL building plans must be submitted to the Architectural Committee <u>prior</u> to any construction.

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. The plans MUST be submitted by Friday at noon to be added to the next week's agenda. The building packets are on our website at surfsideonline.org/forms/ or you can pick them up from the business office.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

Two (2) sets of plot plans must be submitted to the committee. Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.
