Summer RV Season Ends October 31st

- October 31st marks the end of the summer RV season. Unless your lot is exempt per the covenants, RVs must be removed by October 31st.
- In the winter, November 1st to March 14th, you can use a RV winter permit for up to 60 days.
- The winter permit is issued for up to 21 days at a time and **cannot exceed 60 days** total.
- While using a winter permit **you must be actively occupying the RV**, meaning you must be in it each night.
- No full-time RV residency is allowed.
- If you need a winter permit call or visit the office.
- Our RV Storage Lot is currently full, but you can call the office and add your name to the waiting list.
- If you receive a violation notice about RVs, you have **10 days to correct the violation** by removing your RV from your lot. If not corrected within the 10-day timeline, **finest will begin on the 11th day.**
- Fines start at **\$25 a day for the first 30 days**, then go to **\$75 a day beginning on the 31st day.**

Chipping Site Update

Peninsula Landscaping is currently chipping all the yard debris. Work will continue for the next couple of weeks. We will inform you when the work has been completed and when mulch is available to Surfside Members for landscaping.



Please note that Peninsula Landscape Supply does **NOT** accept any yard debris this year any longer! They informed us that they currently have too much debris to process. They will continue the service next year.

The only place that will accept yard debris until Surfside will open the Chipping Site in 2026 is the Transfer Station / Peninsula Sanitation at 4404 E 67th—off Sandridge Road in Long Beach. See details below.

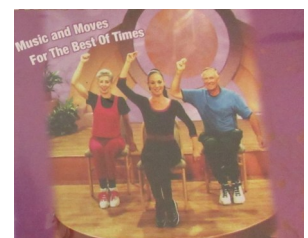


- Garbage: \$174.90 per ton, Minimum of 280 lbs: \$25.37
- **AS OF JANUARY 21, 2022, WE ARE NO LONGER ACCEPTING FILL DIRT, CONCRETE, OR ASPHALT AT FILL RATES, BUT AT GARBAGE RATES.*
- Wood (Unpainted & Untreated) & Brush: \$100.26 per ton - Minimum of 500 lbs: \$25
- Stumps over 8 inches will be charged the regular garbage rate of \$174.90/ton
- Scrap Iron Metal: \$38 per ton, Minimum of 1000 lbs: \$20
- Tires: \$25 Minimum
- Car Tires: \$4 extra, \$5 extra with rim
- Truck Tires: \$6 extra, \$18 extra with rim
- Appliances with Freon: \$10 extra charge for disposal of Freon
- For Sale: Landscape Materials, Landscape Cover: \$30/yard, Compost: \$30/yard. Delivery available upon request.

Seabreeze Lake—Update 10.02.25

In 2025, Surfside treated the most severe blue-green algae bloom experienced on Seabreeze lake. As a result, the current brown coloring of Seabreeze, which is part of the Pacific County drainage system, is likely due to the historic algae bloom die-off. Based on water samples taken, oxygen levels are currently low. The fish die-off is overwhelmingly of the Sculpin species, which appear to be particularly sensitive to low oxygen levels.

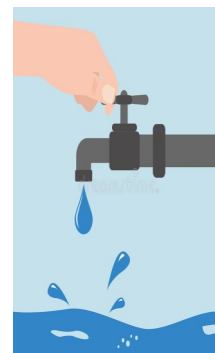
We have communicated with Washington State Fish & Wildlife, and other agencies have been notified of the event. In discussions with two biologists, the recommendation is to continue monitoring for further changes, and to let nature run its course. They have assured us that the water is not toxic, and tests are being run at independent laboratories as confirmation.

There is uncertainty if some of the fish die-off is due to low oxygen levels or a lack of an adequate food supply. With the water clarity improvement in Seabreeze, the lack of vegetation and other food sources are becoming more visible.

Surfside has been working with Fish and Wildlife to remove the grass carp from Seabreeze, so that vegetation will have a chance to regrow in the lake. Adequate native vegetation is needed to help ensure healthy water in Seabreeze lake and create a sustainable environment for aquatic species.

WATER TURN ON/OFF

The Surfside Water Department is happy to either turn your water on or shut it off, between the hours of 8am to 3:30pm. Please remember to call the business office ahead of time during normal business hours and we can make a work order to have this service done for you at no charge. The after hours phone number for the Water Department is for water emergencies only.

Charge into Fire Safety!

This year's Fire Prevention Week™ (FPW™) campaign, October 5-11, "Charge into Fire Safety™: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home," works to educate everyone about using these batteries safely. The campaign stresses how important it is to BUY, CHARGE, and RECYCLE safely when it comes to lithium-ion batteries.

Charge into Fire Safety: 3 Steps

Buy only listed products. When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery look for a safety certification mark such as UL, ETL, or CSA. This means it meets important safety standards.

Charge devices safely. Always use the cords that came with the product to charge. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer. Buy new chargers from the manufacturer or one that the manufacturer has approved. Charge your device on a hard surface. Don't overcharge your device. Unplug it or remove the battery when it's fully charged.

















Recycle batteries responsibly. Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could start a fire. Recycle your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location. Visit call2recycle.org to find a recycling spot near you.

Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home


Most of the electronics we use in our homes every day are powered by lithium-ion batteries. In fact, most everything that's rechargeable uses this kind of battery.

LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES store a lot of energy in a small place. These batteries can overheat, start a fire, or explode if overcharged or damaged. By learning how to **BUY**, **CHARGE**, and **RECYCLE** these batteries safely, you can help prevent a fire in your home.




BUY only listed products. When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery look for a safety certification mark such as UL, ETL, or CSA. This means it meets important safety standards.




STOP using your device right away if the battery smells weird, gets too hot, makes popping noises, changes in shape or color. If it is safe, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.




CHARGE devices safely. Always use the cables that came with the product to charge. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer. Buy new chargers from the manufacturer or one that the manufacturer has approved.




RECYCLE batteries responsibly. Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could start a fire.

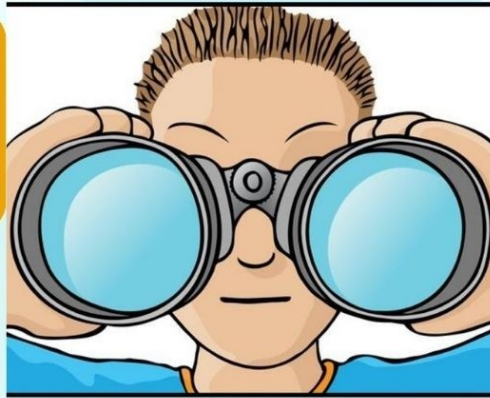


Neighborhood Watch

ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE

Plan on installing a fence, a shed, a gazebo or building a garage or a house?

REMINDER...

ALL building plans must be submitted to the Architectural Committee prior to any construction.

Pacific County will not approve permitting until the committee has signed off on all plans.

The committee meets every Tuesdays at 9 a.m. at the business office. **The plans MUST be submitted by Friday at noon to be added to the next week's agenda.** The building packets are on our website at surfsideonline.org/forms/ or you can pick them up from the business office.

Please notify the business office if you want to attend the meeting in person.

If you are building on a vacant lot without an address, please post a sign so the committee knows which lot will be developed.

Two (2) sets of plot plans must be submitted to the committee. Once approved, you will get a copy of the approved plan. Take it to the county for their approval as needed. Surfside will retain one set of approved plans to keep on file.
